**Passage 1** (for Q.1–Q.2): In the case of *Maneka Gandhi v. Union of India* (1978), the Supreme Court expanded the scope of Article 21 of the Constitution. State of Madras* and held that Articles 19, 21, and 22 are not mutually exclusive but must be read together.
